In the Regulations for Registration there are a number of clauses which indicate that something must be “approved by Council.”

For Full, Temporary, Defined and Postgraduate Registration

Where it states “universities and medical schools approved by Council,” those approved are found in the latest edition of the International Medical Education Directory (IMED) of the Foundation for Advancement of International Medical Education and Research (FAIMER), and include those schools of osteopathic medicine in the United States of America that are listed in that FAIMER Directory.

For Defined Registration

Where it states: “Post graduate training appropriate for the practice approved by Council”, the training approved by Council is either:

For Defined Specialty Practice: certification as a specialist in Canada or another country; or

For Defined Family Medicine Practice: a one (1) year rotating internship (or equivalent) AND have at least two (2) years of licensed clinical practice experience; **OR** a two (2) year training program equivalent to family medicine AND have at least one (1) year of licensed clinical practice experience.

Where it states: “pass examinations acceptable to Council” those acceptable to Council are the Medical Council of Canada Evaluating Exam (MCCEE), Medical Council of Canada Qualifying Exam (MCCQE) Part I, United States Medical Licensing Exam (USMLE), National Board of Medical Examiners (NBME), FLEX, or Education Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates (ECFMG).

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Where it states: “any other conditions which the Council may from time to time prescribe” these conditions are found in the Council’s policy entitled ‘Conditions for Defined License in Family Medicine.’

Where in the ‘Conditions for Defined License in Family Medicine’ it states: “a recognized Canadian physician assessment program approved by Council” that program approved by Council is the Clinician Assessment for Practice Program (CAPP) in Nova Scotia. An assessment in this program requires sponsorship by the College.
